Are Thistles Good or Bad?

The answer to that question really depends on who you are talking to. Many ecologists consider the thistle as a beneficial plant. Surprisingly, the leaves and stalk are edible after removing the thorns, the purple flowers attract bees which in turn aids in the pollination of other plants, birds eat its seeds, and native thistles are thought to crowd out the wild non-native species. The thistle is the national flower of Scotland as well as Lorraine in France. If the thistle has so many virtues, why is it so disliked by ranchers, farmers, and many home owners? Wild thistles such as Milk thistle and bull thistle can have serious impact on rangeland and pastures. Wild thistles can cause nitrate poisoning in cattle and sheep, they reduce forage where cattle graze, and when they are uncontrolled can produce significant green weight by competing for moisture with beneficial plants. Thistles also have spines and prickles that make the plant noxious when one comes in contact with the leaves, stalk, or flower.

Controlling Thistles

Plants can be manually removed by cutting just below the ground. Young plants can be removed by a hoe while mature plants may be removed by brush cutters, shovels, or loppers. Protective clothing is required (remember the spines and prickles). Many authors recommend removing the heads before cutting the plant. Once the flower is fully developed the seeds may mature and then be spread by handling or wind even after being removed from the stalk. Avoid cutting the heads and leaving them exposed to the environment. Herbicides are effective in controlling the spread of thistles when applied early and in an effective and safe manner. Contact a county extension agent, botanist, or a chemical dealer who has experience with different types of herbicides. If you use herbicides, be sure to follow the instructions on the label, using only appropriate concentrations of the chemical. Precautions should be taken to not harm flowering plants and grasses, pets or cattle in the area being sprayed.

TimberCreek Canyon (TCC) is experiencing an inordinate number of thistles this year. Residents should be aware of this increase and make a concentrated effort to reduce the number of thistles around your property. Again, be safe when handling these plants or using chemicals to control them.
